1 Pacific Motorway (M1) (Eight Mile Plains to Daisy Hill)

\$135 million in 2021-22 out of a \$750 million total spend to upgrade the Pacific Motorway between Eight Mile Plains and Daisy Hill and extend the busway. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

2 Daisy Hill Conservation Park Action Plan visitor facilities upgrades

\$500,000 in 2021-22 out of a \$2 million total spend to upgrade infrastructure including walking tracks, bike trails, car park and visitor access at the Daisy Hill Conservation Park.

3 Mabel Park State High School

\$19 million in 2021-22 out of a \$22.5 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces and to provide new skills development and training facilities.

4 Logan City Special School

\$1.7 million in 2021-22 out of a \$2.3 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces.

5 Digital Infrastructure and Connectivity Program

\$2.5 million to support the Program, which seeks to identify the city's current and future digital infrastructure requirements.

6 Pacific Motorway (M1) (Daisy Hill to Logan Motorway), funding commitment

\$4 million in 2021-22 out of a \$1 billion total spend towards upgrades of the M1 between Daisy Hill and the Logan Motorway. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

7 Loganlea Road Healthy Street Project

\$960,000 in 2021-22 out of a \$2.4 million total spend to provide a new shared pathway, pedestrian crossing and streetscape enhancements.

8 Mount Cotton new permanent fire and rescue station

\$2 million in 2021-22 out of a \$7.2 million total spend to continue the construction of the new permanent fire and rescue station at Mount Cotton.

9 Greenbank bus facility, upgrade park 'n' ride

\$3.4 million in 2021-22 out of a \$21 million total spend to upgrade Greenbank bus facility park 'n' ride.

11 Waterford Rugby League Club

\$500,000 in 2021-22 to construct a clubhouse to support rugby league at Meadowbrook. Part of the Activate! Queensland program.

12 Loganlea replacement permanent fire and rescue station

\$3.3 million in 2021-22 out of a \$4 million total spend to continue replacement of the permanent fire and rescue station at Loganlea.

13 Marsden State School

\$9.4 million in 2021-22 out of a \$11 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces.

16 Waterford West State School

\$4.5 million in 2021-22 out of a \$7.5 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces.

17 Park Ridge State High School

\$7 million in 2021-22 out of a \$12.1 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces.

18 Park Ridge State School

\$2.7 million in 2021-22 out of a \$4.7 million total spend to upgrade the administration area.

19 Hydrogen Training Centre of Excellence

\$2 million in 2021-22 out of a \$20 million total spend for phase 2 development of the Queensland Apprenticeship Centre to incorporate a hydrogen training centre of excellence.

20 Beenleigh State High School

\$6.1 million in 2021-22 out of a \$12 million total spend to deliver a new hall facility.

21 Beenleigh Streetscape Improvements and shade solution

\$800,000 in 2021-22 out of a \$2 million total spend to upgrade the Beenleigh CBD streetscape and install a shade solution for the town square to facilitate positive economic and social outcomes for the CBD.

22 Beenleigh Community Health Centre

\$797,858 in 2021-22 out of a \$3 million total spend for the replacement of the Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning (HVAC) systems.

23 Beenleigh Special School

\$4.3 million in 2021-22 out of a \$16.8 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces.

24 Bahrs Scrub Roadworks

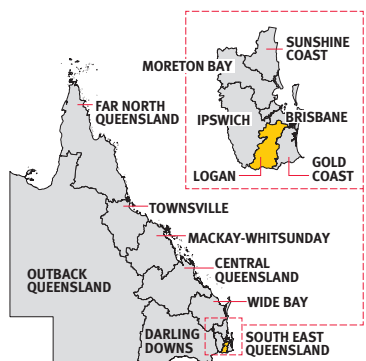
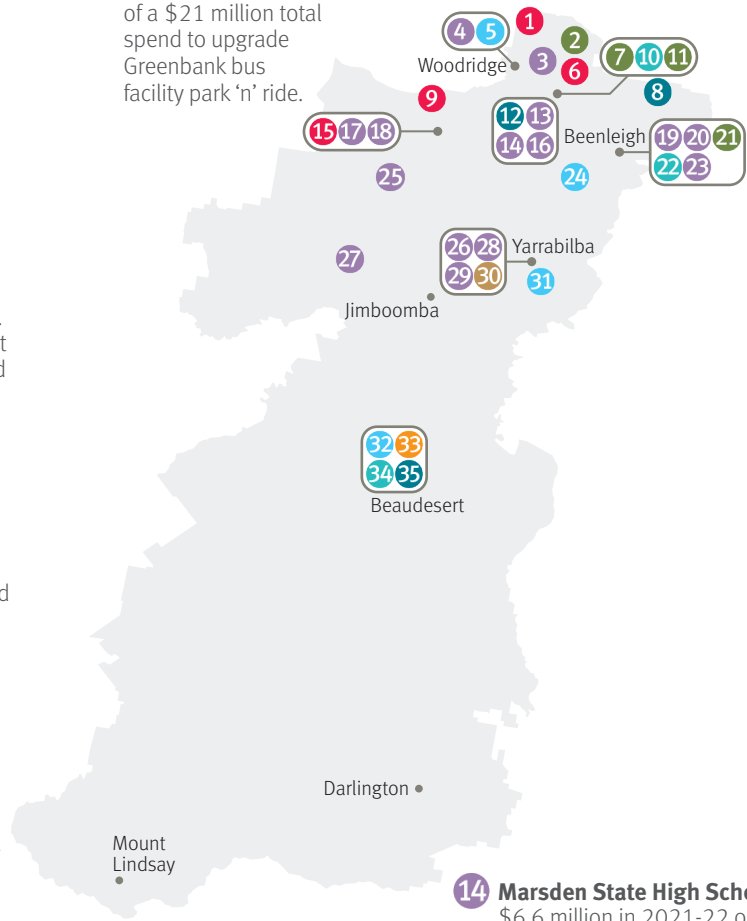
\$27.5 million in 2021-22 to deliver road construction to improve access, safety and transport efficiency through Bahrs Scrub. Part of the Building Acceleration Fund, delivered in partnership with the private sector.

10 Logan Hospital


\$112.5 million in 2021-22 out of a \$591 million total spend to deliver an additional 206 beds and treatment spaces with a vertical expansion of Building 3 and targeted refurbishment of other key locations. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

15 Mount Lindesay Highway (Brisbane - Beaudesert), Johanna Street to South Street (Jimboomba), duplication

\$6.3 million in 2021-22 out of a \$53 million total spend to duplicate lanes on Mount Lindesay Highway between Johanna Street and South Street in Jimboomba. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.



- 25 New primary school in North Maclean (Greenbank)**
 \$21.6 million in 2021-22 out of a \$66 million total spend to construct a new primary school in North Maclean (Greenbank).
- 26 Yarrabilba State School**
 \$20.1 million in 2021-22 out of a \$21 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces.
- 27 Flagstone State School**
 \$4.5 million in 2021-22 out of a \$7.5 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces.
- 28 Yarrabilba State Secondary College**
 \$16.7 million in 2021-22 out of a \$30.5 million total spend to construct stage 2 of Yarrabilba State Secondary College.
- 29 Community TAFE Learning Centre pilot**
 \$1.4 million in 2021-22 out of a \$1.5 million total spend for a community TAFE learning centre pilot in Yarrabilba.
- 30 Yarrabilba Hive**
 \$1.5 million in 2021-22 out of a \$2.6 million total spend to contribute to the construction of a collaborative community hub at Yarrabilba. To be delivered in partnership with Logan City Council, Brisbane Catholic Education and Lendlease.
- 31 Yarrabilba State School Infrastructure**
 \$24.8 million in 2021-22 to deliver infrastructure to accelerate delivery of the next State Primary School at Yarrabilba. Part of the Building Acceleration Fund, delivered in partnership with the private sector.
- 32 Beaudesert Business Park expansion**
 \$1.5 million in 2021-22 out of a \$5 million total spend to expand the Beaudesert Business Park to enable it to continue to attract light and medium industry.

- 33 South West Pipeline**
 \$75.3 million in 2021-22 out of a \$95.2 million total spend to construct a pipeline to connect Beaudesert to the South East Queensland Water Grid to secure long-term water supply.
- 34 Beaudesert Hospital**
 \$525,750 in 2021-22 out of a \$2.4 million total spend for the replacement of two main chillers and the replacement of the emergency and exit lighting, emergency warning and intercommunication systems.
- 35 Beaudesert replacement police facility**
 \$1.6 million in 2021-22 out of a \$7.1 million total spend to complete the replacement police facility at Beaudesert.
- 36 Cultural engagement in Gondwana Rainforests**
 \$275,000 in 2021-22 to promote and develop cultural ecotourism offerings in the Gondwana Rainforests in partnership with First Nations peoples.
- 37 Mobile Police Beats**
 \$1.6 million in 2021-22 out of a \$3.8 million total spend as part of the commitment for 25 new mobile police beats across the state.

Logan manufacturing boost

Logan manufacturer Imaging Solutions is expanding its local testing, manufacturing and production of essential personal protective equipment (PPE) in response to COVID-19, thanks to support from the Queensland Government's Essential Goods and Supply Chain Program.

The funding is part of up to \$50 million being redirected to help Queensland manufacturers make essential goods such as PPE, health consumables and medical devices. As well as building the state's ability to produce PPE, the funding is helping companies develop innovative technologies and advanced manufacturing capabilities.

With the funding, Imaging Solutions is expanding its existing manufacturing capacity, enhancing testing facilities with the adoption of new-to-Australia capability, and introducing innovative technology to support the local manufacturing of the core materials needed to produce its range of specialist PPE products. The company's expansion contributes to keeping Queensland's critical essential health workers safe while also supporting up to 12 new jobs and reducing the reliance on imported PPE imaging products.

Beenleigh's \$20M Queensland Apprenticeship Centre

Queensland is another step closer to becoming a global hydrogen superpower, with the \$20 million construction of phase 2 of the Queensland Apprenticeship Centre to support specialised hydrogen energy training delivery underway. The project is on track for completion by June 2022.

The Beenleigh-based centre is a key part of the Queensland Government's plan to fast-track the development of the state's hydrogen energy industry. Hydrogen is a clean and renewable fuel that can be used in transport, power supply and a range of industrial processes. It's expected to be worth about \$1.7 billion a year in exports by 2030.

New facilities will expand training capacity from 600 to 800 apprenticeships per year in career paths requiring skills in fire protection, gas plumbing, carpentry, electrical work and plumbing. The project is expected to employ 70 apprentices during construction and support a total of 100 jobs. The government's investment in our state's hydrogen production will further boost Queensland's renewable energy industry with approximately \$10 billion of investment since 2015.

Tax relief package

The government provided significant tax relief to support Queensland businesses, landlords, tenants, pubs and clubs, including:

- payroll tax refunds, waivers and deferrals for eligible businesses, targeted at small to medium businesses
- a payroll tax exemption for wages subsidised by the JobKeeper payment
- land tax rebates, waivers and deferrals for eligible taxpayers.

An estimated 370 employers in Logan will also benefit in 2021-22 from the higher payroll tax threshold.

STATEWIDE HIGHLIGHTS

The Queensland Government's Economic Recovery Plan continues to support businesses, workers, families and communities across the state. Our success in managing the health challenges imposed by the COVID-19 pandemic means the state's **\$360 billion** economy has begun to recover sooner and is stronger than the rest of Australia.

2021-22 Budget highlights include:

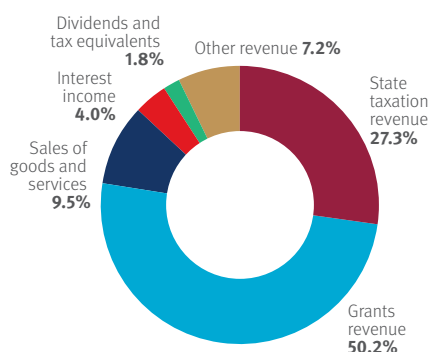
- Record health investment of **\$22.2 billion** will continue to provide a world-class health system, which is also critical to effectively manage the ongoing risks of COVID-19.
- The new **\$3.34 billion** Queensland Jobs Fund focuses on investment attraction and industry development to attract the investment needed to drive ongoing growth, and provide wider economic and employment benefits.
- The **\$52.2 billion** capital program over the forward estimates will help create many thousands of ongoing jobs, including an estimated **46,500** direct jobs in 2021-22.
- **\$460 million** toward targeted investments in flagship skills and training and employment programs Skilling Queenslanders for Work and a revitalised Back to Work program.

Ten new schools

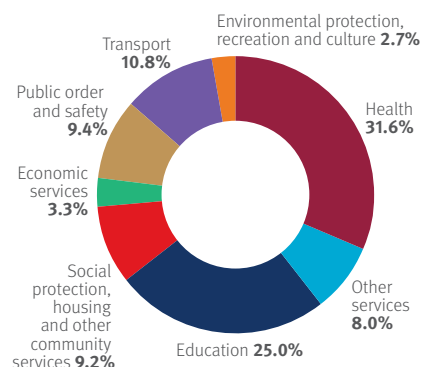
The 2021-22 Budget includes \$913.7 million for 10 new schools to open in 2023 and 2024, as part of the Building Future Schools Program.

- 2023 – primary schools in Yarrabilba, Ripley and the Augustine Heights/Redbank Plains area, and a secondary school in Palmview
- 2024 – primary schools in Redland Bay, Bellbird Park and the Logan Reserve/Crestmead/Park Ridge area, and secondary schools in Springfield and the Collingwood Park/Redbank Plains and Logan Reserve/Park Ridge areas.
