1 Pacific Motorway, Eight Mile Plains to Daisy Hill Upgrade

\$110 million in 2022-23 out of a \$750 million total spend to upgrade the Pacific Motorway between Eight Mile Plains and Daisy Hill and extend the busway. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

2 Daisy Hill Conservation Park Action Plan visitor facilities upgrades

\$1.8 million in 2022-23 out of a \$2 million total spend to upgrade infrastructure including walking tracks, bike trails, car park and visitor access at the Daisy Hill Conservation Park.

3 Croydon Road streetscape upgrades

\$600,000 in 2022-23 out of a \$1.5 million total spend to upgrade streetscape and public domain to Croydon Road and adjoining intersections including areas fronting the Woodridge train station. Part of the 2021-24 South East Queensland Community Stimulus Program.

4 South East Queensland Community Stimulus Program 2021-24 - Logan City Council

\$1.6 million in 2022-23 out of a \$8 million total spend to support Logan City Council investment in new infrastructure and community assets that create jobs and deliver economic stimulus to local communities. Part of the 2021-24 South East Queensland Community Stimulus Program.

5 Woodridge State High School

\$250,000 in 2022-23 out of a \$8.2 million total spend to expand and refurbish existing hall for a specialist HPE sporting facility, dressing room and stage.

6 Kingston State School

\$5 million in 2022-23 out of a \$9.1 million total spend to construct the FamilyLinQ administration building.

9 Logan and Gold Coast Faster Rail (Kuraby to Beenleigh) upgrade

\$31 million in 2022-23 out of a \$2.598 billion total spend to duplicate from 2 to 4 tracks between Kuraby and Beenleigh, including station upgrades and level crossing removals. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

14 Chambers Flat Road and School Road intersection

\$24,000 in 2022-23 out of a \$48,000 total spend to upgrade the Chambers Flat Road and School Road intersection to improve the safety and serviceability of the current configuration. Part of the 2021-24 South East Queensland Community Stimulus Program.

15 Logan Riverine Discovery Centre

\$1.1 million in 2022-23 out of a \$2.8 million total spend for detailed design, construction and fit-out of the Logan Riverine Discovery Centre, Eagleby. Part of the 2021-24 South East Queensland Community Stimulus Program.

16 Beenleigh Special School

\$13 million in 2022-23 out of a \$16.8 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces.

17 Bahrs Scrub Road extension

\$16.3 million in 2022-23 out of a \$18.9 million total spend to deliver road construction to improve access and transport efficiency through Bahrs Scrub. Part of the Building Acceleration Fund, delivered in partnership with the private sector.

18 Yarrabilba Hive


\$780,000 in 2022-23 out of a \$2.6 million total spend to contribute to the construction of a collaborative community hub at Yarrabilba. To be delivered in partnership with Logan City Council, Brisbane Catholic Education and Lendlease.

19 New primary school in Yarrabilba

\$31.4 million in 2022-23 out of a \$62.5 million total spend to construct a new primary school in Yarrabilba. Part of the Building Future Schools Program.

20 Greater Flagstone Priority Development Area

\$11 million in 2022-23 out of a \$31 million total spend to deliver key road projects within the Greater Flagstone Priority Development Area which will support land supply and economic recovery.



10 Logan Hospital

\$176.2 million in 2022-23 out of a \$597.8 million total spend for the delivery of an additional 206 beds and bed alternatives as well as a refurbishment of maternity services including the installation of birthing pools. Part of the Community Health and Hospitals program, delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

11 Loganlea train station relocation

\$16.3 million in 2022-23 out of a \$95.1 million total spend towards the relocation of Loganlea Station. Jointly funded by the Department of Transport and Main Roads and Queensland Rail. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

12 Loganlea replacement permanent fire and rescue station

\$1 million in 2022-23 out of a \$4.8 million total spend to complete replacement of the permanent fire and rescue station at Loganlea.

13 Waterford West State School

\$3.4 million in 2022-23 out of a \$7.5 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces.

7 Pacific Motorway, Daisy Hill to Logan Motorway, funding commitment

\$33.8 million in 2022-23 out of a \$1 billion total spend towards upgrades of the M1 between Daisy Hill and the Logan Motorway. Project cost, scope and timing subject to further planning. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

8 Mount Cotton Road new permanent fire and rescue station

\$6 million in 2022-23 out of a \$7.2 million total spend to continue the construction of the new permanent fire and rescue station at Mount Cotton.



21 South West Pipeline
\$38.3 million in 2022-23 out of a \$95.2 million total spend to construct a pipeline to connect Beaudesert to the South East Queensland Water Grid to secure long-term water supply.

22 Beaudesert town centre revitalisation
\$1.9 million in 2022-23 out of a \$3.8 million total spend to revitalise the Beaudesert town centre including flood mitigation, amenity, picnic facilities, lighting, outdoor amphitheatre, playground and carpark upgrades. Part of the Building our Regions program.

23 Cultural engagement in Gondwana Rainforests
\$261,000 in 2022-23 out of a \$275,000 total spend to promote and develop cultural ecotourism offerings in the Gondwana Rainforests in partnership with First Nations peoples. Part of the \$10.1 million investment in Ecotourism and World Heritage Areas.

24 First 5 Forever
\$280,000 in 2022-23 to deliver the First 5 Forever family literacy initiative at libraries across the community.

25 Health Capacity Expansion Program
\$9.785 billion over 6 years for the Capacity Expansion Program to deliver around 2,200 additional overnight beds at 15 facilities across Queensland, including further expansion of the Logan Hospital.

26 Hear her voice - Report one
\$71.9 million in 2022-23 out of a \$363 million total spend over 5 years to respond to the recommendations of the Queensland Women's Safety and Justice Taskforce in *Hear her voice - Report one - Addressing coercive control and domestic and family violence in Queensland*.

27 Homelessness services
\$5.7 million in 2022-23 to deliver specialist homelessness services.

28 Logan Together: a place-based approach to reduce the rate of disadvantaged children in Logan
\$750,000 in 2022-23 out of a \$3.8 million total spend to continue support for Logan Together to reduce the rate of developmentally vulnerable 0-8 year-olds in Logan.

29 Mobile Police Beats
\$1.6 million in 2022-23 out of a \$3.8 million total spend as part of the commitment for 25 new mobile police beats across the state.

30 Saving Queensland's Koalas
\$7.4 million in 2022-23 out of a \$24.6 million total spend to extend and accelerate implementation of the *South East Queensland Koala Conservation Strategy 2020-2025* and support to the Wildlife Hospital Network.

31 Skilling Queenslanders for Work
\$11.4 million in 2022-23 to fund more training opportunities and increase workforce participation.

Funding boost for Beenleigh Steel Fabrications

The new Beenleigh Steel Fabrications (BSF) facility is almost complete, thanks to funding support from the government \$175 million Jobs and Regional Growth Fund to fast-track the project.

This iconic manufacturer has been helping build our state and support jobs in Logan for more than 4 decades and the \$4.2 million expansion will fuel the company's next 40 years and beyond. BSF steel is at the core of major developments such as Queen's Wharf and Cross River Rail, as well as legendary structures including the Gabba and North Queensland Stadium.

When completed, the expansion will double BSF's floor space and production capacity, creating more jobs for the Logan region. The expansion will create at least 59 jobs over the next 5 years and up to 8 apprentices and trainees each year in boilermaking, rigging, dogging, machine operation and computer skills.

Logan City Special School

New learning centre for Logan City Special School

The Queensland Government invested close to \$8.8 million to build a new learning centre at Logan City Special School to allow teaching staff to cater for the learning needs of more than 220 students from early childhood through to Year 12.

The new 2-storey building opened in 2021, providing 8 learning spaces, one therapy room and other facilities including a staffroom and kitchen. A mix of classroom-style and break-out areas enable teachers to deliver flexible and tailored learning sessions for the school's 222 students, providing resources that the students need to reach their full potential. A new covered set-down area has also provided improved access for families during wet weather.

The Queensland Government is investing \$183.9 million in new and improved education infrastructure in the Logan region during 2022-23.
