for Caboolture Hospital facility improvements

including \$93.7 million in 2022-23 to redevelop the hospital and construct a new multi-storey carpark.

\$4.4B

on health

for the Metro North and West Moreton Hospital and Health Services.

\$42.9M

for social housing

to expand and improve social housing in Moreton Bay.

\$72.2M

on education

to maintain, improve and upgrade schools in Moreton Bay.

\$4.2M

for homelessness services

to deliver specialist homelessness services in Moreton Bay.

1 Kilcoy State High School
 \$2.6 million in 2022-23 out of a \$5.3 million total spend to deliver a new hall.

2 Bruce Highway (Brisbane - Gympie), Caboolture - Bribie Island Road to Steve Irwin Way upgrade
 \$128.3 million in 2022-23 out of a \$662.5 million total spend towards upgrades of the Bruce Highway between Caboolture - Bribie Island Road and Steve Irwin Way. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

3 Bellara Foreshore Improvement Project
 \$600,000 in 2022-23 out of a \$1.5 million total spend for planning, design and construction of new park facilities at Sylvan Beach Esplanade and upgrade to the existing boardwalk structure. Part of the 2021-24 South East Queensland Community Stimulus Program.

4 Queensland Police Citizens Youth Club Caboolture
 \$3 million in 2022-23 out of a \$5 million total spend to contribute funding and make vacant land available for a new Queensland Police Citizens Youth Club (PCYC) at Caboolture.

5 Caboolture Satellite Hospital
 \$139.9 million in 2022-23 out of a \$280 million total spend to deliver 7 satellite hospitals to enable our acute hospitals to continue to safely manage patients via alternative models of care.

6 Caboolture Hospital
 \$93.7 million in 2022-23 out of a \$399.5 million total spend for the Stage One redevelopment of the Caboolture Hospital to support an additional 130 beds and construction of a multi-storey car park.

7 Bribie Island Satellite Hospital
 \$139.9 million in 2022-23 out of a \$280 million total spend to deliver 7 satellite hospitals to enable our acute hospitals to continue to safely manage patients via alternative models of care.

8 Caboolture State High School
 \$3.7 million in 2022-23 out of a \$15.1 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces and upgrade skills development and training facilities.

9 Morayfield Ambulance Station
 \$1.2 million in 2022-23 out of a \$6.2 million total spend to deliver the new 24/7 ambulance station at Morayfield to support communities through the delivery of pre-hospital ambulance responses services.

10 Burpengary train station, Burpengary Road, upgrade station
 \$4 million in 2022-23 out of a \$36.6 million total spend towards design and construction of station accessibility upgrades at Burpengary Station.

11 Bruce Highway (Brisbane - Gympie), Deception Bay Road interchange upgrade
 \$33.7 million in 2022-23 out of a \$163.3 million total spend towards upgrading the interchange on the Bruce Highway at Deception Bay Road. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

12 Deception Bay State School
 \$2.8 million in 2022-23 out of a \$5 million total spend to deliver a new hall.

13 Dayboro replacement police facility
 \$2 million in 2022-23 out of a \$4 million total spend to continue the replacement police facility at Dayboro.

16 Moreton Bay Housing and Homelessness Services Hub
 \$1.2 million in 2022-23 out of a \$3 million total spend for the demolition and redevelopment of the existing Old Pensioners Hall facility into a combined services centre to support homelessness. Part of the 2021-24 South East Queensland Community Stimulus Program.

17 Dakabin Family and Community Place
 \$7.8 million in 2022-23 out of a \$8.1 million total spend for the delivery and support of the Dakabin Family and Community Place at Dakabin State High School.

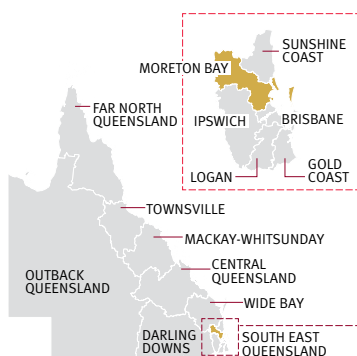
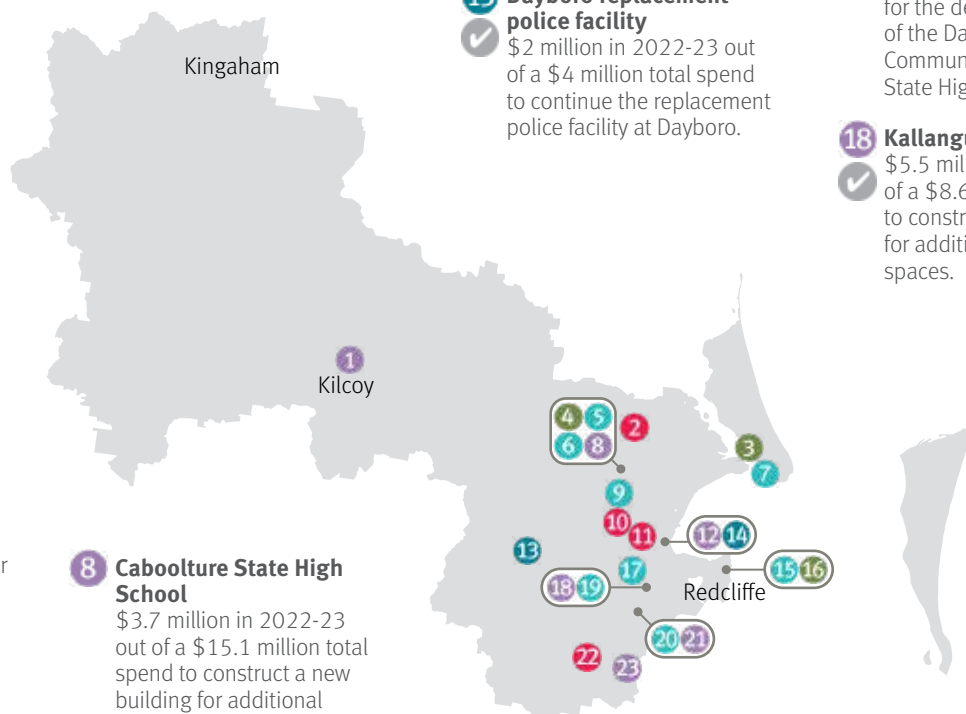
18 Kallangur State School
 \$5.5 million in 2022-23 out of a \$8.6 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces.

14 Moreton Bay Central new permanent fire and rescue station
 \$1.3 million in 2022-23 out of a \$6 million total spend to commence a new permanent fire and rescue station at Moreton Bay Central.

19 Pine Rivers Satellite Hospital
 \$139.9 million in 2022-23 out of a \$280 million total spend to deliver 7 satellite hospitals to enable our acute hospitals to continue to safely manage patients via alternative models of care.

15 Redcliffe Hospital
 \$7.4 million in 2022-23 out of a \$35.1 million total spend for the construction of a dedicated paediatric department within the emergency department, replacement and upgrade of other plant and equipment. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

20 Petrie Ambulance Station
 \$1.7 million in 2022-23 out of a \$5.5 million total spend to replace the Petrie Ambulance Station at Lawnton to support communities through the delivery of pre-hospital ambulance responses services.



21 Pine Rivers Special School
\$9.1 million in 2022-23 out of a \$14.7 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces.

22 Strathpine - Samford Road, Eatons Crossing Road and Mount Samson Road intersection, improve safety
\$16 million in 2022-23 out of a \$57 million total spend towards safety upgrades to Strathpine - Samford Road (Eatons Crossing and Mount Samson Road). Part of the High Risk Roads Initiative, as part of the Targeted Road Safety Program. Funded by the Queensland Government.

23 Albany Creek State High School
\$9 million in 2022-23 out of a \$14.2 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces.






24 Advance Queensland Industry Attraction Fund
\$18.1 million in 2022-23 out of a \$92 million total spend to fund priority sectors and emerging industries by attracting or retaining contestable business projects to generate economic outcomes for Queensland. Part of the Advance Queensland Initiative.

25 Continuation of fisheries reform
\$16.2 million in 2022-23 out of a \$82.8 million total spend for improvements to on-ground biological monitoring, stock assessments and compliance to support evidence-based catch limits and fishing rules. Part of the *Queensland Sustainable Fisheries Strategy 2017-2027*.

26 D'Aguilar National Park visitor facilities upgrade
\$450,000 in 2022-23 to upgrade facilities at Boombana and Manorina in D'Aguilar National Park.

27 Disaster recovery and reconstruction
\$8.6 million in 2022-23 for delivery of recovery and betterment projects to local government assets impacted by disaster events between 2019 and 2022 in Moreton Bay. Part of the joint State/Australian Government Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements.

28 Health Capacity Expansion Program
\$9.785 billion over 6 years for the Capacity Expansion Program to deliver around 2,200 additional overnight beds at 15 facilities across Queensland, including expansion of the Redcliffe Hospital.

29 Hear her voice - Report one
\$71.9 million in 2022-23 out of a \$363 million total spend over 5 years to respond to the recommendations of the Queensland Women's Safety and Justice Taskforce in *Hear her voice - Report one - Addressing coercive control and domestic and family violence in Queensland*.

30 Mobile Police Beats
\$1.6 million in 2022-23 out of a \$3.8 million total spend as part of the commitment for 25 new mobile police beats across the state.

31 Saving Queensland's Koalas
\$7.4 million in 2022-23 out of a \$24.6 million total spend to extend and accelerate implementation of the *South East Queensland Koala Conservation Strategy 2020-2025* and support to the Wildlife Hospital Network.

Morayfield station boosts emergency response

A new \$6.2 million ambulance station in Morayfield will provide better access to pre-hospital healthcare for local communities and help to improve emergency response times across the Moreton Bay region.

The 24-hour station is currently being built and is expected to be fully operational in mid-2024. The site provides good access to major arterial roads, enabling the station to support coverage of the Metro North Local Ambulance Network, meaning more paramedics on the road ready to help Queenslanders. The station will employ 17 paramedics and an Officer-in-Charge, with its location on Morayfield Road allowing for future expansion.

Morayfield is one of 6 locations across Queensland to benefit from the government's \$37.3 million investment into new and replacement ambulance stations over the next 3 years. This investment will significantly increase community access to emergency healthcare services and ensure our paramedics have world-class amenities. Collectively, these infrastructure projects will support around 85 construction jobs.



Boosting housing supply in Caboolture

The Queensland Government has identified Caboolture West as a pilot site to accelerate land supply in South East Queensland to provide homes for around 70,000 people, unlocking more affordable housing in the rapidly growing Moreton Bay region.

The new suburb will ultimately be the size of a regional city, supporting up to 17,000 jobs and providing approximately 30,000 homes. New infrastructure will deliver health and education centres, as well as sport and recreation facilities, to create an affordable and liveable community for Queenslanders.

The Queensland Government has committed \$25.5 million of loan funding for water infrastructure to support the delivery of up to 10,000 new homes across the first 2 stages of planned development in Caboolture West. This includes \$10.5 million from the Building Acceleration Fund and \$15 million from the newly announced \$50 million Growth Acceleration Fund.

Planning this priority growth area has been a coordinated effort between the Queensland Government, Moreton Bay Regional Council, Unitywater and land owners.
