REGIONAL ACTION PLAN QUEENSLAND BUDGET 2023–24

The 2023–24 Queensland Budget supports **good jobs**, provides **better services** for all Queenslanders and protects our **great lifestyle**. In Logan it provides:

\$1.4B on infrastructure
for productivity enhancing infrastructure and capital works, estimated to support around **4,100** jobs in this region.

\$3.4B on health
for the Metro South Hospital and Health Service.

\$127.7M on education
to maintain, improve and upgrade schools in Logan.

\$50.1M for social housing
to expand and improve social housing in Logan.

\$11.2M for Skilling Queenslanders for Work
to fund more training opportunities and increase workforce participation.

\$6.4M for homelessness services
to provide essential housing and support services for people experiencing or at risk of homelessness in Logan.

First Home Owner Grant

6,783 grants worth \$112.8 million paid to home buyers to help them buy their first home in Logan.

\$12.6 million of payments have been paid to 548 employers in Logan to employ 1,008 eligible unemployed jobseekers.

Apprentice and Trainee Payroll Tax Rebate

\$13.9 million of rebates claimed by 480 businesses to reinvest into their business and support employment in Logan.

Advance Queensland

\$11.1 million in grants awarded to 249 applicants to drive innovation, build on our natural advantages, and help raise Logan's profile as an attractive investment destination.

1 Pacific Motorway, Eight Mile Plains to Daisy Hill upgrade



\$110 million in 2023-24 out of a \$750 million total spend towards upgrading the Pacific Motorway between Eight Mile Plains and Daisy Hill, increasing capacity and reducing congestion, providing improved road access, better active transport and more access to public transport. This investment is estimated to support an average of 721 direct jobs over the life of the project. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

3 Mount Cotton Road new permanent fire and rescue station



\$8.2 million in 2023-24 out of a \$10.5 million total spend to complete the new, permanent Mount Cotton Road Fire and Rescue Station which will provide contemporary, frontline fire and emergency response capability to the communities of Mount Cotton and Carbrook. The new station will future-proof our emergency response and ensure the community continues to receive the critical services they deserve. Additionally, the construction supports 29 jobs for Queenslanders.

5 Everleigh State School



\$19.7 million in 2023-24 out of a \$68.6 million total spend to construct Everleigh State School. The school opened to students in 2022. Stage 2 of the project will increase capacity at the school to cater for up to 1,400 students, providing quality education facilities in the growing North MacLean and Greenbank communities. The project is supporting an average of 63 jobs across 3 years from 2021-22 to 2023-24.

2 Kingston State School



\$7.3 million in 2023-24 out of a \$15.2 million total spend to construct the FamilyLinQ administration building. The facility, delivered in partnership with the Bryan Foundation, will feature onsite health services, a kitchen and informal lounge and a central play space to connect families, providing a one-stop-shop for education, health and community services. This project is supporting an average of 14 jobs across 3 years from 2021-22 to 2023-24.

4 Logan Hospital



\$143.6 million in 2023-24 out of a \$1.06 billion total spend for expansions and improvements at the Logan Hospital site, including the Stage 1 Expansion that will provide 206 additional beds, the rapid expansion modular ward with 28 new beds, and the maternity refurbishment project. This also includes the \$530 million Stage 2 Expansion of the Logan Hospital, which will significantly boost capacity by delivering around 112 extra overnight beds as well as more surgical theatres. It will enable the hospital to deliver an increased range of services locally, allowing even more locals to receive care closer to home. Part of Capacity Expansion Program. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.

6 South West Pipeline



\$24.4 million in 2023-24 out of a \$95.2 million total spend to construct a 24-kilometre pipeline connecting Beaudesert to the South East Queensland water grid. The pipeline is part of Seqwater's long-term water security solution for the Scenic Rim, supporting the region's growing population and economic development. Once complete it will be the largest addition to the grid since construction of the Northern Pipeline Interconnector in 2012. Up to 100 jobs have been supported during construction with almost 90 per cent of those filled by local tradespeople.



Yarrabilba's new school delivers for Logan

The Queensland Government is investing \$66.3 million into the new South Rock State School in growing Yarrabilba to support young families in the Logan region.

In 2023, Stage 1 of the school opened for Term 1 for Prep to Year 6. The school features an administration building, prep and general learning spaces, a resource centre, multi-purpose hall, canteen, car parking, amenities, an oval, and a special education learning centre. Stage 2 will deliver more learning spaces to support the local community.

This project has supported an average of 48 full-time equivalent jobs over the last 5 years to 2022-23. South Rock will boost the local schooling network by providing enrolment relief to Yarrabilba, Logan Village and Cedar Creek state schools. When complete, the school will be able to support more than 1,200 students.

Springwood Ambulance Station
 \$1.5 million in 2023-24 out of a \$8.1 million total spend to redevelop and relocate the facility to provide fit for purpose and modern accommodation to support the delivery of pre-hospital ambulance response services.
- 
Croydon Road streetscape upgrades

 \$519,000 in 2023-24 out of a \$1.5 million total spend to upgrade streetscape and public domain to Croydon Road and adjoining intersections including areas fronting the Woodridge train station. Part of the 2021-24 South East Queensland Community Stimulus Program.
- 
Logan City Council - Digital Infrastructure and Connectivity
 \$1.3 million in 2023-24 out of a \$2.5 million total spend to improve the quality and coverage of digital infrastructure in the Logan City Council area.
- 
Logan Gardens Shared Ring Road Stage 1
 \$891,000 in 2023-24 out of a \$1.4 million total spend for a new pedestrian and cycle prioritised internal park road. Part of the 2022-24 Local Government Grants and Subsidies Program.
- 
Pacific Motorway, Daisy Hill to Logan Motorway funding commitment

 \$32 million in 2023-24 out of a \$1 billion total spend (under Australian Government review) towards upgrading the M1 between Daisy Hill and the Logan Motorway. Project cost, scope and timing subject to further planning.
- 
Logan and Gold Coast Faster Rail
 \$240 million in 2023-24 out of a \$2.598 billion total spend (under Australian Government review) towards the Logan and Gold Coast Faster Rail project. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.
- 
Loganlea train station relocation
 \$10 million in 2023-24 out of a \$95.1 million total spend (under Australian Government review) towards the relocation of Loganlea Station. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.
- 
Advanced robotic automation technology systems for manufacturer of bulk liquid storage and transportation systems
 \$2.5 million in 2023-24 to install 'first-to-Australia' advanced robotic automation technology systems for a manufacturer of bulk liquid transport and increase competitive advantage in the Asia-Pacific region. Part of the Made in Queensland Grant Program.
- 
Park Ridge State High School
 \$882,000 in 2023-24 out of a \$12.1 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces.
- 
Beenleigh Ambulance Station
 \$300,000 in 2023-24 out of a \$16.5 million total spend for the replacement of the existing ambulance station to support the delivery of pre-hospital ambulance responses services.
- 
Logan Riverine Discovery Centre

 \$951,500 in 2023-24 out of a \$2.8 million total spend for detailed design, construction and fit-out of the Logan Riverine Discovery Centre, Eagleby. Part of the 2021-24 South East Queensland Community Stimulus Program.
- 
Beenleigh Kitchen Project
 \$500,000 in 2023-24 out of a \$1 million total spend for new kitchen facilities to support food tourism experience at Beenleigh Rum Distillery. Part of the Tourism Experience Development Fund, delivered in partnership with the private sector.
- 
Greenbank Battery
 \$85.5 million in 2023-24 out of a \$325.3 million total spend for the 200 megawatt Greenbank Battery storage capable of powering 60,000 homes for 2 hours during the evening peak. Part of the Queensland Renewable Energy and Hydrogen Jobs Fund.
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Flagstone State School
 \$534,000 in 2023-24 out of a \$10.9 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces.
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Greater Flagstone Priority Development Area
 \$2 million in 2023-24 out of a \$31 million total spend to deliver key road projects within the Greater Flagstone Priority Development Area which will support land supply and economic recovery.
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Beaudesert town centre revitalisation
 \$462,500 in 2023-24 out of a \$8.4 million total spend to revitalise the Beaudesert town centre. Project includes parkland upgrades, flood mitigation works, pathways, lighting, and carpark upgrades. Part of the Building our Regions program, delivered in partnership with the Australian Government and the Scenic Rim Regional Council.
- 
Beaudesert Courthouse
 \$4.9 million in 2023-24 out of a \$22.2 million total spend over 4 years (2022-23 to 2025-26 and \$144,000 ongoing) to replace the current Beaudesert courthouse.
- 
Staying Connected in the Lost World
 \$135,688 for the installation of a solar power system as the main power source of all accommodation on the property. Part of the Building Resilient Tourism Infrastructure Program and the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements.
- 
Additional Electricity Bill Support

 \$1.483 billion in 2023-24 for electricity bill support, including a \$550 rebate for all Queensland households, a higher \$700 vulnerable households rebate and a \$650 small business rebate.
- 
Ecotourism Australia - ECO Destination Certification program - Ecotourism

 \$23,900 in 2023-24 out of a \$143,900 total spend for certification through Ecotourism Australia for the ECO Destination Certification program - Ecotourism level for the Scenic Rim Regional Council region. Part of the Tourism Activation Fund, delivered in partnership with the Scenic Rim Regional Council.

First 5 Forever

 \$280,000 in 2023-24 to deliver the First 5 Forever family literacy initiative at libraries across the community.
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Logan Together: a place-based approach to reduce the rate of disadvantaged children in Logan

 \$750,000 in 2023-24 out of a \$3.8 million total spend to continue support for Logan Together to reduce the rate of developmentally vulnerable 0-8 year-olds in Logan.
- 
Modern Manufacturing Initiative

 \$13 million in 2023-24 out of a \$153.5 million total spend to support businesses to adopt new technologies and improve their manufacturing processes. Part of the Queensland Jobs Fund and the Modern Manufacturing Initiative, delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.
- 
Public library grants

 \$1.7 million in 2023-24 to supply library resources to public libraries in Logan. Part of the Public Library Grants.
- 
Queensland First Home Owner Grant

 \$72 million in 2023-24 to provide first-time home buyers buying or building a new home with grants to get into the market sooner.
- 
Raise, repair and retrofit homes, as part of the Resilient Homes Fund

 \$219.9 million in 2023-24 out of a \$381 million total spend to allow eligible homeowners to raise, repair or retrofit their homes to incorporate flood resilient design and materials to reduce the impacts of future flood events.
- 
Youth Co-responder teams

 \$30.1 million in 2023-24 out of a \$96.2 million total spend statewide over 4 years to continue to deliver and expand the youth co-responder model to deal with or divert high risk young people. Part of the Youth Justice Investment.
