REGIONAL ACTION PLAN QUEENSLAND BUDGET 2023–24

The 2023–24 Queensland Budget supports **good jobs**, provides **better services** for all Queenslanders and protects our **great lifestyle**. In Moreton Bay it provides:

\$925.3M on infrastructure for productivity enhancing infrastructure and capital works, estimated to support around **2,700** jobs in this region.

\$4.9B on health for the Metro North and West Moreton Hospital and Health Services.

\$120.3M on education to maintain, improve and upgrade schools in Moreton Bay.

\$52.9M for social housing to expand and improve social housing in Moreton Bay.

\$9.7M for Skilling Queenslanders for Work to fund more training opportunities and increase workforce participation.

\$4.9M for homelessness services to provide essential housing and support services for people experiencing or at risk of homelessness in Moreton Bay.

First Home Owner Grant

6,849 grants worth \$115.3 million paid to home buyers to help them buy their first home in Moreton Bay.

Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements

An estimated \$52.6 million of the total grants paid and payable to local government authorities in Moreton Bay for reconstruction, betterment and other projects to recover from natural disaster events that occurred between 2019 and 2023. The program is jointly funded by the Queensland Government and the Australian Government.

Back to Work

\$20 million of payments have been paid to 886 employers in Moreton Bay to employ 1,526 eligible unemployed jobseekers.

Advance Queensland

\$5.2 million in grants awarded to 308 applicants to drive innovation, build on our natural advantages, and help raise Moreton Bay's profile as an attractive investment destination.

1 Bribie Island Neighbourhood Centre redevelopment



\$2.9 million in 2023-24 out of a \$3 million total spend to replace the existing Bribie Island Neighbourhood Centre building with a purpose-built facility to continue to meet growing demand for support. The redevelopment will open the door for more services and supports for people in need, deliver better services and provide job opportunities for local people during construction.

3 Dayboro replacement police facility



\$4.4 million in 2023-24 out of a \$4.8 million total spend to complete the replacement police facility at Dayboro. The modern facility will support frontline policing at the local level and allows sufficient space for future growth. This facility will support frontline policing services to deliver safe and secure communities and build a safer Queensland. The project will support 14 jobs.

5 Dakabin Family and Community Place



\$7.5 million in 2023-24 out of a \$8.1 million total spend for the delivery of the Dakabin Family and Community Place at Dakabin State High School. The community hub will provide the coordination and delivery of programs and services designed to meet the health, education and social support needs of the community and are tailored to suit families with children aged 0 to 12 years.

2 Burpengary train station upgrade



\$14.3 million in 2023-24 out of a \$53 million total spend towards accessibility improvements at Burpengary station through the construction or upgrade of operational facilities including full length high-level platforms, overpass with forward exiting lifts, compliant entries via pathways or ramps, accessible toilets, and enhanced services and facilities, such as upgraded customer service window, increased hearing aid loop coverage, additional shelters, new customer information screens, and wayfinding signage.

4 Redcliffe Hospital



\$14.8 million in 2023-24 out of a \$1.175 billion total spend for a major expansion of the Redcliffe Hospital, which will include a new clinical services building, ambulatory care services building, and refurbishment of the existing hospital to deliver additional capacity across clinical support and facility support services. The Redcliffe Hospital Expansion is expected to deliver 204 additional beds and support more than 2,500 construction jobs. It is due to be completed in the second half of 2028. This major expansion will significantly increase the care offered across the range of inpatient and outpatient services at the hospital. Part of the Capacity Expansion Program.

6 Bray Park State High School



\$17.4 million in 2023-24 out of a \$17.7 million total spend to construct a new building, including 10 classrooms and an undercroft for 9 future classrooms, located within the industrial technology precinct, and an extension to the existing manual arts facility. The project caters for significant in-catchment enrolment growth at the school, and provides modern, fit-for-purpose specialist teaching spaces. The project is supporting an average of 17 jobs across 3 years from 2021-22 to 2023-24.



New learning centre for Kallangur State School

With an investment of \$11.8 million from the Queensland Government's Growth Learning Spaces program, Kallangur State School's new learning centre will cater for the growing school community.

The 2-storey learning centre will have 8 classrooms and feature outdoor learning areas, practical learning areas, staff facilities and amenities. Included in works at the school are refurbishments to 3 teaching blocks, to modernise the rooms and increase classroom sizes.

In keeping with the school's 93-year tradition of community connection, the project is involving local businesses and workers, and is also boosting training hours for tradespeople and apprentices. Work on the new learning centre is expected to be completed in August 2023, and refurbishments are likely to finish in early 2024.

Moore Linville rural fire brigade station
 \$700,000 in 2023-24 to complete the Moore Linville Rural Fire Brigade Station which will enable contemporary, front-line rural fire service delivery to the Moore and Linville communities. Additionally, the construction will support 2 local jobs.
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Kilcoy State High School
 \$1.9 million in 2023-24 out of a \$5.3 million total spend to deliver a new single court multipurpose hall with a kinesiology lab, staff work rooms, store rooms, amenities and a kiosk.

Woodford Youth Detention Centre
 A new youth detention centre will be built at the Woodford Correctional Precinct.

Woodford State School
 \$1.3 million in 2023-24 out of a \$1.5 million total spend to upgrade an existing amenities block.
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Bruce Highway (Brisbane - Gympie), Caboolture - Bribie Island Road to Steve Irwin Way upgrade
 \$42.4 million in 2023-24 out of a \$662.5 million total spend towards upgrading the Bruce Highway between Caboolture - Bribie Island Road and Steve Irwin Way. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.
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Bellara Foreshore Improvement Project
 \$519,000 in 2023-24 out of a \$1.5 million total spend for planning, design and construction of new park facilities at Sylvan Beach Esplanade and to upgrade the existing boardwalk structure. Part of the 2021-24 South East Queensland Community Stimulus Program.

The Better Communities Hub
 \$291,919 in 2023-24 out of a \$444,949 total spend delivered in partnership with the private sector to enhance community infrastructure by providing training facilities and skills development programs for people in need and living with a disability. Part of the Community Infrastructure Investment Partnership.
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Abbey Museum art gallery and café - Abbey Medieval Festival Site redevelopment
 \$1.4 million in 2023-24 out of a \$2.1 million total spend for a new art gallery, cafe, and event infrastructure for the Abbey Museum Festival. Part of the Regional Tourism Recovery Program.
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Caboolture Satellite Hospital
 \$78.9 million in 2023-24 out of a \$376.9 million total program spend to deliver 7 satellite hospitals that will each include a Minor Injury and Illness Clinic and various specialty outpatients services.
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Caboolture Hospital
 \$41.3 million in 2023-24 out of a \$406.8 million total spend for the redevelopment of the Hospital and refurbishment of critical clinical support services, an 8-chair Chemotherapy Unit and a multi-storey carpark. Part of the Community Health and Hospitals Program, delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.
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Caboolture West catalytic water supply and sewerage infrastructure
 \$21.1 million in 2023-24 for essential water and sewerage infrastructure necessary to assist in delivering new land supply for housing development in Caboolture West. Part of the Building Acceleration Fund, delivered in partnership with the private sector.
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Morayfield Ambulance Station
 \$6.7 million in 2023-24 out of a \$8.5 million total spend to deliver the new ambulance station to support the delivery of pre-hospital ambulance responses services.
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Deception Bay Branch Little Athletics Centre Inc.
 \$1 million towards a synthetic running track on Zammit Oval at Deception Bay.
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Deception Bay State School
 \$4.3 million in 2023-24 out of a \$8.2 million total spend to deliver a new hall facility.
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Moreton Bay Central new permanent fire and rescue station
 \$3 million in 2023-24 out of a \$6.8 million total spend to continue a new permanent fire and rescue station at Moreton Bay Central.
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The Redcliffe District Rugby League Football Club Incorporated (Dolphins)
 \$2 million for development of new high quality floodlights to the Redcliffe Dolphins.
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Moreton Bay Housing and Homelessness Services Hub
 \$1 million in 2023-24 out of a \$3 million total spend for the demolition and redevelopment of the existing Old Pensioners Hall facility into a combined services centre to support homelessness. Part of the 2021-24 South East Queensland Community Stimulus Program.
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Lawnton Ambulance Station
 \$6.2 million in 2023-24 out of a \$7.8 million total spend to replace the Petrie Ambulance Station at Lawnton to support the delivery of pre-hospital ambulance responses services as part of improved health services.
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Bruce Highway (Brisbane - Gympie), Gateway Motorway to Dohles Rocks Road upgrade funding commitment
 \$23 million in 2023-24 out of a \$948 million total spend towards upgrading the Bruce Highway between Pine River and Dohles Rocks Road. Project cost, scope and timing subject to further planning and negotiation with the Australian Government. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.
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Ferny Hills State School
 \$1 million in 2023-24 out of a \$1.2 million total spend to upgrade an existing amenities block.
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Additional Electricity Bill Support
 \$1.483 billion in 2023-24 for electricity bill support, including a \$550 rebate for all Queensland households, a higher \$700 vulnerable households rebate and a \$650 small business rebate.
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Modern Manufacturing Initiative
 \$13 million in 2023-24 out of a \$153.5 million total spend to support businesses to adopt new technologies and improve their manufacturing processes. Part of the Queensland Jobs Fund and the Modern Manufacturing Initiative, delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.
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Queensland First Home Owner Grant
 \$72 million in 2023-24 to provide first-time home buyers buying or building a new home with grants to get into the market sooner.
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Raise, repair and retrofit homes, as part of the Resilient Homes Fund
 \$219.9 million in 2023-24 out of a \$381 million total spend to allow eligible homeowners to raise, repair or retrofit their homes to incorporate flood resilient design and materials to reduce the impacts of future flood events.
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Youth Co-responder teams
 \$30.1 million in 2023-24 out of a \$96.2 million total spend statewide over 4 years to continue to deliver and expand the youth co-responder model to deal with or divert high risk young people. Part of the Youth Justice Investment.
