REGIONAL ACTION PLAN QUEENSLAND BUDGET 2024-25

The 2024-25 Queensland Budget supports Queenslanders. In Moreton Bay it provides:

\$1,300

electricity bill support

for Queensland households – an upfront \$1,000 Cost of Living Rebate from the Queensland Government and a \$300 rebate paid in quarterly instalments from the Australian Government.

\$5.5B

for health

for the Metro North and West Moreton Hospital and Health Services.

\$115M

for education

to maintain, improve and upgrade schools in Moreton Bay.

\$1.3B

for the Big Build

for productivity-enhancing infrastructure and capital works, estimated to support **3,500** jobs in Moreton Bay.

Delivering for MORETON BAY



Free Kindy

Up to 6,160 children eligible for free kindy in Moreton Bay, for 15 hours per week, 40 weeks per year.

(January 2024 to May 2024)



Fee-Free TAFE

7,699 fee-free TAFE courses commenced by people in Moreton Bay wanting to train, retrain or upskill in priority industries.

(January 2023 to March 2024)



Skilling Queenslanders for Work

\$42.6 million allocated to develop skills and provide training to 5,727 people in Moreton Bay, including 3,578 people who are now employed as a direct result of their participation in the program.

(July 2015 to April 2024)



First Home Owner Grant

7,225 grants worth \$121.1 million paid to home buyers to help them buy their first home in Moreton Bay.

(July 2016 to April 2024)

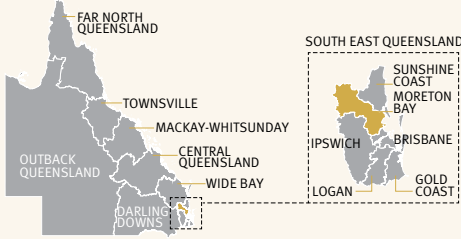

1 Construction of Woodford Youth Detention Centre



\$185.1 million in 2024-25 out of a \$627.6 million total projected spend to construct the new 80-bed Woodford Youth Detention Centre. This project is estimated to support the creation of around 600 construction jobs over the next three years. The centre will include therapeutic design elements aimed at supporting the rehabilitation of young people and improving community safety.

2 Bribie Island Neighbourhood Centre redevelopment



\$2.4 million in 2024-25 out of a \$2.9 million total spend to construct a purpose-built Bribie Island Neighbourhood Centre, a space where community members of all backgrounds will have a chance to connect and find support. The delivery of this critical social infrastructure will create connections and opportunities for community participation, encourage involvement in local community initiatives and events and help combat social isolation and loneliness. Supporting the Communities 2032 strategy.

3 Caboolture Hospital Redevelopment Stage 1



\$31.7 million in 2024-25 out of a \$367.7 million total spend to deliver Caboolture Hospital Redevelopment Stage 1, modernising and expanding facilities to meet the community's growing needs. The redevelopment will support the Building Better Hospitals program through delivery of an additional 130 beds and refurbishment of critical clinical support services. When operationalised, the project will initially provide a bed capacity of 110, along with space for a 20-bed Rehabilitation Unit. Part of the Building Better Hospitals program.

4 Griffin State School



\$18.4 million in 2024-25 out of a \$25 million total spend to deliver a new three-storey learning centre with six learning spaces, a music rehearsal and practice space, open learning areas, amenities and a lift. The project will also deliver new and refurbished administration buildings, including information technology facilities and visiting specialist rooms.

5 Build new Petrie substation



\$5.5 million in 2024-25 out of a \$22.7 million total spend for Energy Queensland to build a new substation at Petrie to support a safe and reliable electricity network and accommodate for the growth of the surrounding community. This infrastructure will secure the existing and future electricity supply to the community in Petrie, and accommodate for future population and economic growth.

6 Bruce Highway (Brisbane - Gympie), Gateway Motorway to Dohles Rocks Road upgrade (Stage 1)



\$30 million in 2024-25 out of a \$948 million total spend committed towards upgrading the Bruce Highway between the Gateway Motorway and Dohles Rocks Road, and upgrading the Gympie Arterial Road between Strathpine Road and Gateway Motorway (stage 1). Each day, around 160,000 vehicles travel between the Moreton Bay Region and north Brisbane on the Gateway Motorway, Bruce Highway and Gympie Arterial Road. Significant population growth is increasing travel demand through this road corridor, with current traffic levels expected to increase by around 50% by 2041. This investment is part of the integrated planning underway for Gateway Motorway and Bruce Highway upgrades in north Brisbane and the Moreton Bay Region. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.



Another 204 beds for Redcliffe Hospital

A major expansion of the Redcliffe Hospital will deliver 204 extra beds for the growing Moreton Bay region, thanks to Queensland Government funding of over \$1.1 billion.

The development will deliver additional operating theatres, emergency department treatment spaces, birthing suites and medical imaging facilities. The project also includes pharmacy and pathology areas as well as endoscopy, outpatient consult and diagnostic rooms. Work on the project supports more than 2,500 jobs and is due for completion in 2028.

Expansion of the Redcliffe Hospital is part of the Queensland Government's Health Big Build, investing more than \$14 billion delivering new and upgraded facilities right across the state including more than 3,300 additional hospital beds over six years.

Woodfordia
 \$1 million in 2024-25 out of a \$4 million total spend to grow the sustainability of this signature festival, boost cultural tourism and generate long-term economic benefits for the wider region.

Kilcoy State High School
 \$2.2 million in 2024-25 out of a \$12 million total spend to deliver a new hall facility.
- 
Network Battery - Bribie Island
 \$7.4 million in 2024-25 out of a \$11.1 million total spend to install a 4 megawatt/8 megawatt-hour battery to store excess solar PV generated by Bribie Island's 5,000 solar customers. Part of the Queensland Energy and Jobs Plan.
- 
Caboolture Watchhouse Hub
 \$15.1 million in 2024-25 out of a \$45.4 million total spend to operationalise the Caboolture Watchhouse Hub for young people.
- 
Caboolture West catalytic water supply and sewerage infrastructure
 \$40.7 million in 2024-25 for essential water and sewerage infrastructure necessary to assist in delivering new land supply for housing development in Caboolture West. Part of the Building Acceleration Fund, delivered in partnership with the private sector.
- 
Dayboro replacement police facility

 \$2.4 million in 2024-25 out of a \$6.7 million total spend to complete the replacement police facility at Dayboro.
- 
Deception Bay State High School
 \$4.9 million in 2024-25 out of a \$11.8 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces.
- 
Redcliffe Hospital expansion - new clinical services building
 \$87 million in 2024-25 out of a \$1.148 billion total spend to construct a new clinical services building, including ambulatory care services and refurbishment of the existing hospital. Part of the Capacity Expansion Program.
- 
AI digital machining and milling centres - digital factory stage 1
 \$298,230 in 2024-25 out of a \$397,640 total spend to help small and medium sized manufacturers to increase their international competitiveness, productivity and innovation, and to generate high-skilled jobs. Part of Made in Queensland - Round 5.
- 
Bruce Highway (Brisbane - Gympie), Dohles Rocks Road to Anzac Avenue upgrade (Stage 1)
 \$80.9 million in 2024-25 out of a \$290 million total spend towards Bruce Highway (Brisbane - Gympie), Dohles Rocks Road to Anzac Avenue upgrade (Stage 1). Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.
- 
North Pine Dam improvement and staged strengthening projects - planning
 \$14.3 million in 2024-25 to continue planning and investigatory works for North Pine Dam improvements to comply with dam safety standards and ensure a safe and secure water supply.
- 
Bray Park State High School
 \$16.3 million in 2024-25 out of a \$22.4 million total spend to construct a new building for additional learning spaces.
- 
Disaster Management Reforms

 \$30 million in 2024-25 to progress the government's commitment from the Independent Review of Queensland Fire and Emergency Services. Part of the government's Emergency Management Reforms.
- 
Disaster recovery and reconstruction

 \$11.9 million in 2024-25 for recovery and betterment projects for local government assets impacted by disaster events between 2020 and 2024 in the Moreton Bay region. Part of the joint State/Australian Government Disaster Funding Arrangements.
- 
Free TAFE Nursing

 \$58 million in 2024-25 out of a \$162.6 million total spend to provide 6,500 training places for eligible Queenslanders who are passionate about healthcare to study the Diploma of Nursing for free in 2024 and 2025.
- 
Growth projects in Moreton Bay

 \$19.8 million in 2024-25 out of a \$26.7 million total spend to deliver additional learning spaces in Moreton Bay.
- 
Homelessness services

 \$232.2 million in 2024-25 to provide essential housing and support services for people experiencing or at risk of homelessness.
- 
Homes for Queenslanders

 \$600,000 in 2024-25 to support improved housing outcomes for people with disability and those experiencing domestic and family violence in Queensland.
- 
Integrated Zero Emissions Vehicles charging infrastructure

 \$8 million in 2024-25 out of a \$12 million total spend for electric vehicle charging infrastructure and to explore innovative "smart" integration and management of the infrastructure. Part of Queensland's Zero Emission Vehicle Strategy and the National Electric Vehicle Strategy.
- 
Quantum Strategy and Academy

 \$27.9 million in 2024-25 out of a \$89.7 million total spend to develop and deliver the whole-of-government Queensland Quantum and Advanced Technologies Strategy and Queensland Quantum Academy.
- 
Queensland Fire and Rescue appliances

 \$23.8 million in 2024-25 for replacement and new fire and rescue appliances.
- 
Queensland Skills Strategy 2024-28

 \$96.7 million in 2024-25 out of a \$203.1 million total spend to further strengthen the state's training system to deliver skills needed for our economy and provide access to good jobs with better pay for Queenslanders. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.
- 
Raise, repair and retrofit homes

 \$76.7 million in 2024-25 out of a \$231 million total spend for eligible homeowners to rebuild, repair or retrofit their homes with flood-resilient design and materials to reduce the impacts of future flood events. Part of the Resilient Homes Fund.
- 
Recruitment Drive - additional police personnel

 \$25.9 million in 2024-25 out of a \$87.5 million total spend to support the recruitment of additional police personnel.
- 
Saving Queensland's koalas

 \$7 million in 2024-25 out of a \$31.3 million total spend to extend and accelerate conservation of koalas in South East Queensland.
- 
Social housing

 \$64.4 million in 2024-25 to expand and improve social housing. Delivered in partnership with the Australian Government.
- 
South East Queensland Liveability Fund

 \$85 million in 2024-25 out of a \$200 million total spend to support South East Queensland local government projects that create liveable, creative, sustainable and healthy communities. Part of the South East Queensland City Deal, delivered in partnership with the Australian Government and the Council of Mayors - South East Queensland.

Youth Co-Responder Teams

 \$6.7 million in 2024-25 out of a \$20.4 million total spend to deliver and expand the youth co-responder model to divert high risk young people, including those on bail, and those subject to electronic monitoring. Part of the government's Youth Justice Investment.
